FPCA CONVENES 70TH ANNUAL SUMMER TRAINING CONFERENCE AND EXPOSITION



The Florida Police Chiefs Association convened its 70th Annual Summer Training Conference and Exposition August 6 -10, 2022, in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida.

"With over 200 attendees enjoying a full suite of training sessions, over 100 exhibitors in our trade show, and addresses from Florida's elected leaders, this year's conference was the perfect opportunity for law enforcement executives to network, learn, and discuss the most pressing issues facing our profession," said FPCA President and Fellsmere Police Department Chief Keith Touchberry.

This year's training sessions included tackling the difficult but necessary work of changing culture through trust and communication, recruiting and retaining talent, managing generational differences, addressing team dysfunction from the squad level to command, and receiving state agency and legislative updates. Of particular interest was a session on implementing Co-Responder Team Programs, a new model that pairs officers with mental health professionals to respond to incidents involving individuals experiencing behavioral health crises.

The trade show included many returning sponsors and several first-time exhibitors, and spanned a range of products and services.

Attendees also welcomed hearing from U.S. Senator Marco Rubio, Attorney General Ashley Moody, and Senate President Wilton Simpson in person, and video addresses from U.S. Senator Rick Scott and Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis.

FPCA also announced the Police Officer, Command Officer, and Chief Executive "Of the Year" awards, and the Rocky Pomerance Excellence in Policing and Public-Private Partnerships awards, and installed the 2022 - 2023 officers and board.

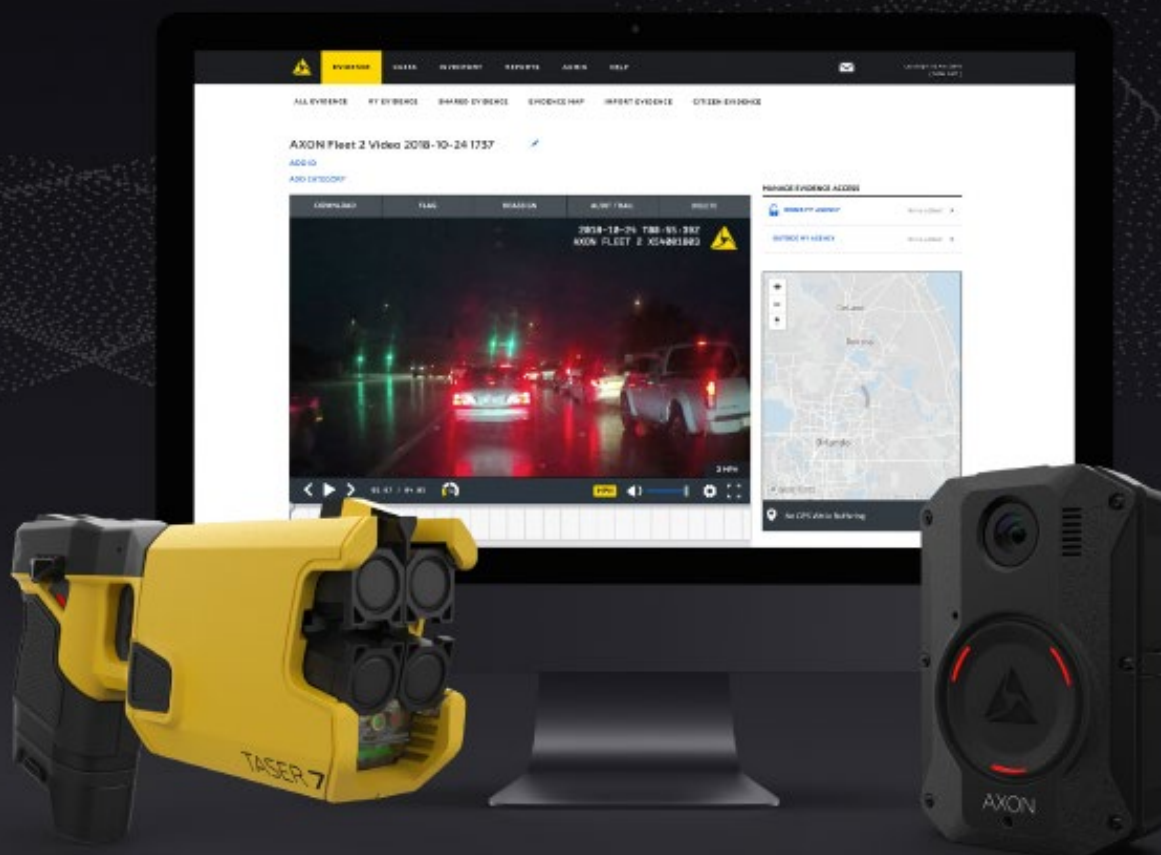

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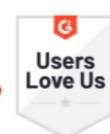
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FPCA ISSUES FIVE ENDORSEMENTS FOR 2022 STATEWIDE CANDIDATES

FPCA endorsed a slew of candidates in statewide races this year for the 2022 election. Most recently, during and after the annual conference, FPCA endorsed the reelections of Ashley Moody for Attorney General and Jimmy Patronis for Chief Financial Officer, and Wilton Simpson for election as Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

FPCA President Chief Keith Touchberry said, "General Moody has devoted her entire career to enforcing our laws, preserving the safety of our communities, and upholding the rule of law." FPCA 2nd Vice-President Chief Charlie Vazquez, said, "General Moody's initiatives like her Be A Florida Hero officer recruitment initiative and #BackTheBlue officer recognition program are just a few examples of her leadership on behalf of law enforcement."

Regarding Patronis, Chief Touchberry said, "CFO Patronis has consistently made the health and welfare of first responders a priority all the time, not just when it's politically convenient, and we know we can count on his continued leadership." FPCA 1st Vice-President Chief Charles "Chuck" Broadway said, "CFO Patronis has always led from the front during times of tragedy, delivering the support first responders need to do their job."

Endorsing Simpson, Chief Touchberry said, "President Simpson cares about law enforcement officers and their families, and he's demonstrated consistent leadership on issues like expanding the opportunity for first responders to report and receive treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder."

In April, FPCA endorsed Marco Rubio for reelection as U.S. Senator, with then-FPCA President Chief Stephan Dembinsky saying, "Senator Rubio has been a consistent supporter of law enforcement in our nation's capital, standing not just for public safety but for the health and welfare of law enforcement officers, even when it hasn't been politically popular."

FPCA began the year standing with Governor Ron DeSantis at a press conference in January to announce the endorsement of his reelection as Governor. Said Chief Dembinsky at the time, "From his commitment to safe communities and defending the rule of law, to his unwavering support for the profession of law enforcement through better pay and bonuses to help agencies recruit and retain the most capable, professional officers, Governor DeSantis has always had our back. Now we have his."



FPCA NAMES 2022 LEGISLATORS OF THE YEAR

FPCA announced the 2022 Legislator of the Year award recipients at this year's awards luncheon.

"Every year, the Florida Police Chiefs Association honors those legislators who, through hard work and dedication, demonstrate their commitment to the betterment of law enforcement and public safety in Florida," said FPCA President Chief Keith Touchberry. "This year, we applaud each of these Senators and Representatives for passing legislation that improves officers' lives and their families' lives by recognizing the hard work of law enforcement, and expanding the time to seek and receive potentially life-changing mental health treatment."

Sponsored by Representatives Tomkow and Leek, HJR 1 and the implementing measure HB 1563 propose an additional \$50,000 homestead property tax exemption for first responders, as an acknowledgement of their contribution to the public welfare, and to help recruit and retain the best officers. The constitutional amendment must still be approved by voters.

As leader of the upper chamber, Senate President Simpson worked diligently to ensure passage of HB 689 and HJR 1 / HB 1563, and stood strongly against calls to defund the police.

Said FPCA Immediate Past President Director Stephan Dembinsky, "I'm honored that as one of my last acts as president of the Florida Police Chiefs Association, I gave our Legislator of the Year awards to this distinguished group of public servants."

Receiving the awards were: Senate President Wilton Simpson, Sen. Jennifer Bradley, Sen. Danny Burgess, House Speaker Chris Sprowls, Rep. Mike Giallombardo, Rep. Jason Fischer, Rep. Tom Leek, and Rep. Josie Tomkow.

Sponsored by Representatives Giallombardo and Fischer, and Senators Bradley and Burgess, HB 689 was FPCA's top legislative priority for 2022. The bill expands the time for a first responder to report post-traumatic stress disorder symptoms to qualify for workers' compensation benefits and treatment.

In addition to awarding him Legislator of the Year, FPCA also proudly endorsed Wilton Simpson for Commissioner of the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services.

Speaker of the House Chris Sprowls has been a staunch supporter of FPCA's priorities, and this year was no different. His leadership was critical to the passage of some of the most impactful public safety legislation, including HB 3 which will greatly assist with the recruitment and retention of law enforcement officers in Florida.



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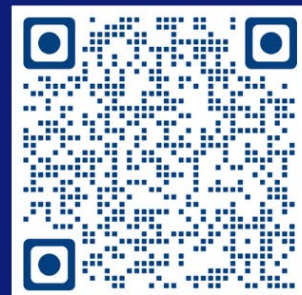
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FPCA TRAINING SESSIONS ON THE CUTTING EDGE

FPCA puts a priority on quality professional development, and this year's annual training conference delivered with 13.5 credit hours. Two sessions stood out in particular for their content and the reception given to them by attendees.

Lewis G. Bender, Ph.D, Professor Emeritus at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, presented his topic, "Managing Across Generations", and judging by the attendees' responses, this is a pressing concern at the top of everyone's minds.

Directly related to the challenges of recruiting and retaining the best young officers and support staff, Dr. Bender's main thrust was that "you" are not recruiting and managing "you" anymore. Taking pains to stress that he was not making value judgments, but rather honest observations about what has changed, Dr. Bender pointed out that younger cohorts are present regarding – looking at a job "for now" and not looking at it as a profession. This leads to a lack of ownership of results and a conflict-averse predisposition. On top of that, a reliance on personal technology devices has created a generation that lacks strong interpersonal communication skills exactly when the public is demanding greater emotional sensitivity.

Dr. Bender went on to discuss the effects these social currents have on a command staff's ability to effectively run an organization, and offered suggested solutions to the problem. These included: dividing work goals into discreet, achievable parts; providing clarity of expectations, steady feedback, and accountability; leading by questions (ask/discuss) to get buy-in; and reexamining recognition approaches by increasing frequency and prioritizing time flexibility as a reward.

The training session seemed a big hit with attendees as Dr. Bender held the room's attention, and even went a little long due to questions and discussions.

Chief Harvette Smith, North Miami Beach Police Department, was attending her first Florida Police Chiefs Association annual conference. Said Smith, "The training and discussion panels were excellent, and I would have benefited from attending before I became Chief. I'll definitely be giving my command staff that opportunity and bringing them to future conferences."

Also of particular interest was a panel discussion on implementing Co-Responder Team Programs, a new model that pairs officers with mental health professionals to respond to incidents involving individuals with mental health crises.

Participating on the panel were Chief Anthony Holloway and Chief Lawrence Revell and their respective teams from the St. Petersburg and Tallahassee Police Departments.

The panel agreed that agencies were all over the map on how they were implementing this new model. Generally, they involve a crisis intervention officer to secure the scene, a mental health counselor, and a paramedic if needed. In addition, because of the novelty, panel participants agreed that agencies should stay flexible as they determine what works for them locally.

The Tallahassee department's process has already evolved, initially not allowing transport in the dedicated TEAM vehicle, but then outfitting those vehicles for transport use. In addition, the department is now using technology and intelligence to identify points of multiple or repeat calls and divert those from 911. Building on the program's success, the department is also adding additional teams to go beyond the daytime response and provide services through the evening hours.

The St. Petersburg department's CALL program is a joint effort with the non-profit Gulf Coast Jewish Family & Community Services, described as helping people move through crisis with dignity and without having to be handcuffed, tased, etc. As described, the biggest challenge to a program of this type is trust, both for the clients being assisted and patrol officers taking part. Media is also a challenge, with rumors and misnomers about defunding police. In fact, these are added services, and the department has actually added officers.

Suggestions included having your union president present when you announce a program like this to the force, for buy-in, and ensuring you're providing enough training so that officers understand that the mental health counselor needs to take the lead on these response calls. On an especially positive note, the panel participants agreed program success dispelled initial skepticism, and officers now see these programs as a critical supplement, and would probably complain if it was removed.

Chief Tracy Frazzano, Marco Island Police Department, had previously attended an annual conference as a newly appointed chief, but this year attended as a recent graduate of FPCA's New Chiefs seminar. Said Frazzano, "It was a good experience, and a good opportunity to meet other chiefs, stay current on the issues, and share what's working and what isn't."

DIRECTOR DEMBINSKY BIDS FAREWELL, RECOUNTS FPCA'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

As my term as President of the FPCA draws to a close, I am pleased to inform you that during the past year, your FPCA accomplished many of our stated goals and is underway on many others. With great pride, here are some of those accomplishments:

We passed our PTSD initiative, House Bill 689, to expand the time for first responders to report and qualify for treatment and benefits under the workers' compensation law. Even more impressive, we achieved this high priority goal in our first year advocating for its passage. This is an amazing feat as it usually takes a few years to pass a bill of this magnitude.

We increased our presence before the Florida Legislature by having uniformed Chiefs visit our legislators during session. FPCA encourages all members to take the time to form relationships with their local representatives.

We streamlined our process for making political endorsements, so that FPCA can more timely respond to endorsement requests and make a bigger impact in elections. Just through this cycle so far, we have participated in four endorsement events for both statewide and national offices.

We continued to recognize and honor the legends of our profession by renaming the Chief Executive of the Year award to the William B. Berger Chief Executive of the Year.

We began the process of refocusing the Florida Police Chiefs Education and Research Foundation's mission towards officer wellness.

We are proposing bylaw changes to make permanent the Subcommittee on Accountability and Societal Change that FPCA formed in the summer of

2020, so that we can continue to take note of and guide the evolution of policing in our state.

We are working to expand and enhance our collaborations with the Florida Sheriffs Association, as this has repeatedly shown to be mutually beneficial. Our joint success on the PTSD benefits bill is a good example.

We are developing new membership initiatives designed to drive member value and ensure that the FPCA is doing everything it can to support you and your agency. These proposed bylaw changes will offer new membership categories, and benefits such as insurance, distance learning, enhanced training opportunities, and digital publications.

We smoothly and successfully transitioned FPCA leadership to our new executive director, Jennifer "Cookie" Pritt, while still benefitting from the institutional knowledge of our recently retired director, Amy Mercer, who now leads our professional development program.

I personally visited every FPCA district in Florida that extended an invitation for a visit from their association president, and I believe we were positively received in every case.

Finally, I am extremely grateful to Cookie and her staff who have given me all the support a President could hope for. They are a good team and FPCA is fortunate to have them on board. Be safe, be well.

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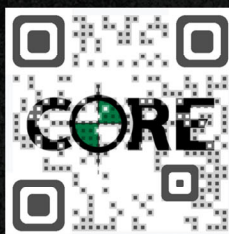

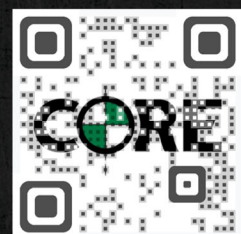
